## 8 Habits of Evangelism – Radical Welcome

How do we welcome those who both walk through our doors on Sunday morning and those who enter our life the other days of the week? Answering **both** questions is the focus of the first habit identified in the series "8 Habits of Evangelism".

The author of this first habit, Shanea D. Leonard, identifies "**radical welcome**" as the spiritual practice of embracing and being changed by the gifts, presence, voices and power of *The Other*: the people systemically cast out of or marginalized within a church, a denomination and/or society. Radical welcome is beyond the spirit of hospitality or the presence of a visitors' gathering for fellowship after morning worship. Radical welcome is an embrace of openness that exists in a fundamental effort to live into the mandate of whosoever will, come (*Rev. 22:17*).

The biblical warrant for welcoming others so radically comes from both the Old and New Testaments. Specifically, in Deuteronomy we find these words: "For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bribe, who executes justice for the orphan and the widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them food and clothing. You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt" (10:17-19). And in Luke Jesus says, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will save it. What does it profit them if they gain the whole world, but lose or forfeit themselves?" (9:23-25).

Loving strangers because once we were strangers before God and losing our life for the sake of the Gospel are models for how we welcome others in the life of the church and as we live our faith beyond the walls we inhabit on Sunday mornings. Both avenues of welcome are necessary if we are to actively engage in evangelism on behalf of the Gospel. In other words, we both have to adopt a spirit of openness to others both on Sunday mornings and figure out what it means to communicate the grace, hope, and love of God in Jesus Christ as we interact with people of varying backgrounds throughout the rest of the week if we are to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

Evangelism, as I wrote last month, is not about filling our pews, offering plates, or the leadership positions of our congregation; as important as those things are to the life, ministry, and well-being of our congregation. Rather, *evangelism* is *sharing the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ through a variety of means*; as we gather in the building we know as our church-home and in how we interact with others throughout the rest of the week.

As we think about both who we have welcomed and who we have yet to share the good news of Jesus Christ with in our life, some questions that might help us explore "radical welcome" more faithfully are:

- Which communities of people are absent from our congregation and life of faith?
- What do you feel have been the barriers to our congregation living into radical welcome and what do you hope to reimagine for our future together?
- How have you prepared personally to engage in connection with those who have been "othered"?
- In what ways have you practiced radical welcome in your faith community?
- Where do you see places where First Presbyterian Church of Twin Falls can extend a more radical welcome?

When we are ready to welcome all of our community into the good news of Jesus Christ then we will be well on our way of living even more fully as living examples of God's love in the world.

## Minutes from August Session Meeting Tuesday, August 17th

The meeting opened with prayer at 5:30, a quorum being present. Eleven elders were in attendance. The minutes from July's meeting were approved, with the addition of Chris Talkington in attendance.

## **Unfinished Business**

• A Futuring Discussion and BBQ was held on Saturday, August 28th at the home of Chris Talkington.

• New Elders: all spots are filled with the Class of 2024. Carol Benson was added as a new elder.

## New Business

• Terms of staff employment were discussed. A motion was passed, stating that all employees working 20 hours a week or more are entitled to receive benefits such as paid holidays and vacations. Clarification will be made at the September meeting on pay raises. Currently, employees are not entitled to an automatic pay raise every year.

• Set-up and cleanup for communion: in the past, this was the responsibility of the deacons; since we no longer have deacons, there will be a sign-up sheet for those willing to set up the elements.

• A minute-for-mission on Stewardship will be presented on September 19th by Judy Pollow.

## **Committee Reports**

• **Building and Grounds:** The elevator door was repaired in a timely manner. Change in the language of the contract was approved. Approved replacement of electric igniters on the kitchen stove in building one. Approved the application from TF rec for the use of the gym on four nights/week Oct 18th through mid-February. John Howar will contact Justin Wolters about gym cleaning schedule. Evans Plumbing repaired leaking toilets in the girls' bathroom 2nd floor of building two. The rent paid by Pinecrest Academy will increase effective July 1st, based on enrollment. The future use of buildings two and three was discussed. Lawrence will investigate repair of the leak around the dome on the roof on Building one entry. WiFi building one: two networks currently exist. Phillip Nance has proposed a network security service contract; will be discussed at the next meeting. Worship in the Fellowship Hall was discussed, as was upgrading Power Point system connection; no action was taken.

• **Nurture:** The Family "Summer Shenanigans" event has been rescheduled for Sunday, September 12th at 4:00. Sunday School will begin September 19th at the church. The multipurpose room off the Fellowship room will be used both on Sundays and during the week. A calendar will be used to schedule usage. Artwork will soon be hung in the room along with a white board and a screen mounted to a wall for DVR use. Window coverings are being considered. We have FPC scholarship funds which can be used.

• **Fellowship:** the movie "Up" will be shown at the movie event on August 31st at 8:00 in the courtyard. We will soon have a new set of pictures in the Fellowship Hall.

• **Treasurer:** the financial report through July was presented. Our budget is not sustainable now by giving; this needs to be addressed.

## **Hygiene Kits**

For the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Intergenerational Worship Hour on October 31, the Christian Nurture committee will be asking for help putting together 64 hygiene kits to send to families whose homes have recently been destroyed by hurricanes and floods. If you would like to donate, please bring the items listed below to church on Sunday or to the church office during the week.

(Value \$15, recommended \$2 processing fee per kit)

- 1 hand towel (approximately 16" x 28", no fingertip or bath towels)
- 1 washcloth
- 1 wide-tooth comb (remove from package)

1 — nail clipper (UPDATE: nail clippers with metal files or emery boards attached are now accepted; remove from package)

- 1 bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- 1 toothbrush (in original packaging)
- 10 Band-Aids® or other adhesive bandage strips

Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Toothpaste which has an extended expiration date will be added to international Hygiene Kit shipments just prior to shipment. Seal all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure.



## Sandwich Saturday Ministry

Sandwich Saturday began serving sack lunches in October. We prepared 25 lunches which included a handmade peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an apple, 2 cookies, a bag of chips and a bottle of water. Lunches are packed in an assembly line manner practicing social distancing. We set up a table on the sidewalk in front of the church and hung banners inviting any-one needing a lunch. Any left over lunches were placed in the blessing box.



When the number of Covid-19 cases increased, we began purchasing the Smucker's frozen peanut butter and jelly sandwiches.

With the weather reaching colder temperatures, we had fewer lunches picked up from the table. It was then decided to reach out in to the community and we learned that a number of families with children are living in the motels on Addison Avenue West. We now deliver 25 lunches to the Apollo Inn who in turn distributes to families in need living in that group of motels. Recently we learned that the SureStay Hotel on Blue Lakes also has a need and we have begun delivering 20 lunches to them. 65 lunches are now being prepared and distributed every other Saturday. This includes the 20 offered in front of the church.

We appreciate all the volunteers who are helping with the purchasing of groceries, setting up the assembly line, filling the lunch bags, hanging the banners, delivering the lunches, and helping with clean-up. Thank you to all of those who have helped!!! We have compiled a list of those interested in helping and emails are sent out on a rotation basis. We start filling the bags at 11:30 and are usually finished with that component by 11:45. The lunches are then delivered and others stay to help with clean-up, preparation for the next serving date, or help with the table in front of the church. We are completely finished by 1:00. This ministry not only helps others but provides an opportunity for fellowship among our congregation as well.

## Children' Ministry Programs Sunday School K-5

We are just beginning to offer in-person Sunday School which is meeting downstairs in the Fellowship Room. So far, we are observing the usual mask/social distancing protocols. It is great to be able to greet the K-5 children with Bible Stories and crafts.

We will continue to offer LEGOS lessons which will be mailed out each week. That way we can reach everyone!

If, at any time, you have questions or input about how we are reaching out to families, please share them with us. We entertain all possibilities about meeting your family's needs. Look for an opportunity in late May or June to get together outside with kids and parents to create ideas and get reacquainted and eat together.
