In college, I worked for the US Forest Service in Northern Idaho. I lived on mountain tops in fire lookout towers searching for fires. As many know, Nancy has recently written a book about the fire lookouts and it will be available in mid-June. It was a lonely job with isolation from people for long stretches of time. Occasionally I developed "fire lookout fever" (kind of like island or cabin fever) and I would need to get off the mountain. One-day



Nancy and I decided to take our old, decrepit pick-up truck and follow a logging road we had not been on. It was lined with conifer trees. The road was extremely narrow with steep drop-offs down the mountainside. We crept along the road for several miles until a fallen tree blocked our way. There was no room to turn around neither was it reasonable to back the truck for several miles. I made the terrible mistake of not bringing a saw for such a problem. What was I to do? The only tool I had was the truck. I positioned the vehicle against the tree, put it in the granny gear (the lowest gear) and pushed hoping the truck would be capable of moving the tree. Fortunately, the truck did its job and we were able to continue.

Occasionally, on one of life's roads when a barricade blocks the way we wonder, "What am I to do?" A death occurs, a relationship is broken, a job or career ends, a friend moves away or retirement begins.

Even in the church something can happen causing us to ask the same question. "What am I to do?" I have frequently asked myself that question in challenging times and my first inclination has normally been, "turn back". Unfortunately, "turning back" is often the most un-useful of options. My mountainside road experience helped me to understand the best direction when facing obstacles, is forward. Push forward with all the courage and strength you can gather. Inevitably, forward is always the best option.

As you face obstacles that cause anxiety, it is okay to look back, but never attempt to go back, for backwards is likely to be the most un-useful of directions. Go forward and that is the message of the Gospel. Though going forward is filled with uncertainty, going backwards is filled with what no longer exists. We walk with our God and God's direction is not reverse. God's direction is always forward. It must be the same for us and the church. Forward, for that is the direction God is moving.

This ministry is a great opportunity for fellowship with other Church members and a great


way to help our local community.

Memorial Day May 29th

Memorial Day is more than an excuse for a cookout and day off from work. The holiday was created to honor the many American men and women who died in military service. This focus on those who made the ultimate sacrifice sets it apart from Veterans' Day, which honors all military veterans, living and dead.

Why is the Poppy associated with Memorial Day?

Poppies are associated with those who died in wartime since World War 1. The red color of the poppy is not a symbol of blood, death or support of war, instead poppies were the only flowers that grew in war-torn battlefields. When the country sides were only mud and devastation the poppy flowers sprouted and flourished. Colonel John McCrae, Canadian soldier in 1915 wrote the poem "In Flanders Field".

The poem inspired 2 women Anna E. Guerin of France and Miona Michael of Georgia, together they sold artificial poppies to benefit the children left orphaned by the War, and by 1922 the poppy was adopted as the official memorial flower of the VFW.

In Flanders Fields

By: Colonel John McCrae In Flanders Fields the poppies blow between the crosses, row on row, that mark our place: and in the sky the larks, still bravely singing, fly. Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago we lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, loved and were loved, and now we lie in Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: to you from failing hands we throw the torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die we shall not sleep, though poppies grow in Flanders Fields.


If you are interested in being transported to the church for worship or other church events, please contact the church and we will seek to arrange a driver to bring you to and return you home from worship and events.

We get together once a month at a local restaurant for fun, food and fellowship!



Beginning July 16, 2022, 988 became the new three-digit dialing code connecting people to the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, where compassionate, accessible care and support is available for anyone experiencing mental health-related distress—whether that is thoughts of suicide, mental health or substance use crisis, or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support.

The Pentecost Offering unites us in a church-wide effort to support young people and inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world.


Investing in our greatest resource Help youth begin life with a solid foundation of faith
