

We are always in need of donations, it's easy to bring a non-perishable food item on




Sunday before worship and place in donation bin in lobby. We appreciate everyone who helps and donates to keep this important charity going strong.

Don and Nancy Hammond spent three exciting, magical fire seasons in Idaho's St. Joe National Forest. Interspersing personal stories with regional fire history as well as dangers and details of the work, Nancy journeys back to the narrow catwalks and stunning panoramas - a place where a single lightning strike could ignite a raging wildfire.

Some summers are destined to generate cherished memories. For married high school sweethearts Don and Nancy Hammond, they happened in 1972 and 1973, when Don's lifelong dream of being a United States Forest Service fire lookout came true.

Don's first post, the Dunn Peak Lookout, was located eight miles northwest of Avery in Idaho's St. Joe National Forest. Once they arrived, they breathlessly lugged provisions and water up steep stairs to its fifteen-by-fifteen-foot cab two stories above the forest floor. Furnishings included a single bed, small bookcase, cabinet, and table, and a wood stove. There was no electricity or running water. A battery powered two-way Motorola radio would be their only connection to the outside world. That night, engulfed by lightning strikes and filled with adrenalin, they faced their first storm.

Unless it was foggy or raining, the Forest Service required Don to conduct binocular searches from the catwalk at least twenty minutes of every hour while he was on duty. He watched for smoke during the day and the glow of fire at night, and learned to distinguish between blue smoke plumes and white wisps of fog. Despite the primitive conditions, Don, Nancy, and their Dalmatian, Misty, settled in and came to love their lookout life. They spotted wildfires, were startled by their first cougar scream, encountered a wide variety of human and animal visitors, discovered delectable huckleberry patches, and simply enjoyed the enchanting beauty all around them.



FATHER'S DAY - JUNE 18TH

Father's Day is the day to recognize, honor and celebrate the sacrifices and accomplishments of fathers. In 1910, Washington State Governor declared Father's Day on the 19th of July. It then became a permanent federal holiday in 1972 when President Richard Nixon proclaimed that the third Sunday in June would be further known as Father's Day. On this day, children celebrate their fathers and father figures to show their

love and appreciation. We love you Dad!



HISTORY TRIVIA

June 6 - D-Day Anniversary: Day of awareness & appreciation for everyone that fought in Normandy to defeat the Nazis and re-establish freedom.

June 14 Flag Day: Americans celebrate the meaning of their nation's flag, honor the traditions associated with its care. The Flag of the United States is to be honored and carries with it both history and tradition. On June 14, 1777 the Flag Resolution was signed, making the current stars and stripes the National Flag of the United States of America. On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson called for the nation-wide observance of Flag Day. In 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed congress' decree, making June 14th of each year National Flag Day.

June 24 - St. John the Baptist: This day commemorates the life of John the Baptist, a Jewish preacher who baptized Jesus in the Jordan River. In the first chapter of Luke, the father of St. John, Zachary, is approached by an angel who tells him that he and Elizabeth, even though they were old, would have a child. Zachary didn't believe the angel right away, and was unable to speak until after John was born. St. John has two feast days in the Roman Catholic Church. The first, held June 24, acknowledges his birth. The second, August 29, commemorates his death.

JUNE 27 - PTSD AWARENESS DAY

Brings awareness to the disorder known as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

PTSD is a disorder which triggers anxiety and flashbacks due to experiencing or witnessing terrifying events.

PTSD was mainly associated with veterans who returned from combat, but recent studies show that about 20% of Americans suffer from PTSD.

PTSD Awareness Day was established in 2010 after Army Staff Sgt. Named Joe Biel took his own life in 2007 after returning home from duty in the Iraq War and suffering a PTSD attack.

Beil's birthday was chosen as PTSD Awareness Day to honor him and those who suffer with the disorder.

Roger Keller Retiring from Magic Valley High School Congratulations!



Magic Valley High School principal announces retirement Roger Keller, who has been the principal of Magic Valley High School for 10 years, has announced his retirement, drawing a 36-year career in education to a close.

"Roger Keller has been a tremendous leader and has lead Magic Valley High School as they support students who have overcome so much to continue their education," Superintendent Brady Dickinson said in a statement. "We are proud of his work and are excited to see where his next adventure leads."

Prior to leading the MVHS team, Keller served as principal at Buhl High School for four years, and as associate principal at Twin Falls High School for one year. He served as dean of students at Kimberly High School from 2000-08.

His education career began in 1987 at Twin Falls High School where he taught consumer economics and was an assistant basketball and football coach. In 1994 Keller took a position at Kimberly High School where he taught accounting, business law, economics, and fitness. He also served as the head boys basketball coach and assistant football coach during his time at Kimberly.

Keller was named Idaho Secondary School Principal of the Year in

2021. Keller also holds accolades for his coaching. He was named Idaho Distinguished Basketball Coach of the Year in 2007.
