"Sacrament", the word, derives from the Latin word Sacramentum which means "holy". The Roman Catholic Church recognizes seven sacraments while the Protestant Church recognizes two; baptism and communion. Jesus directed his disciples to preach the Gospel to all nations and to baptize and teach them to observe all that he commanded (Matthew 28: 19). There are three Gospel accounts where Jesus gives the communion meal to his disciples (see below).

Some traditions of the Church developed long after Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Good theological reasons are usually the basis for church traditions but some traditions

are practical. An example of a practical tradition is the covering of the bread and drink (which is not done at First Presbyterian) on the communion table. Some believe the cover enhances the holy mystery of the event. The reason for the cover originated for practical reasons in the great cathedrals of Europe. Pigeons roosted and flew inside the building. To protect the communion elements from what pigeons do, the wine and bread were covered. The cover's original purpose was practical, not theological.

Baptism is considered the first and most important sacrament because Jesus directed it. Though I suspect all the disciples of Jesus were baptized, however, there is no Biblical reference that speaks directly about his 12 disciples' baptism. Jesus did command the taking of the communion meal, the other sacrament. What must not be ignored when reading any of the three Biblical accounts of the meal: (Matthew 26: 26-27, Mark 14: 22 and Luke 22: 19-20), is what Jesus did not say or require. His words did not include a requirement for baptism to receive communion. The only requirement he placed was to "do this in remembrance of me" which can easily be understood as belief in him as the Christ. Though traditions of the Church are often based upon strong foundations, it is not heretical to question them and ask if they are truly serving the people as Jesus directed.

A question often asked of me has been about children taking communion. Accepted tradition is only after their confirmation. It is my opinion the parent or other adult family member is to decide if the child will eat and drink or to wait for another time. However, the parents' responsibility is to help the child understand the meals meaning. It is not the responsibility of the church to make that decision. It is my belief the church has no authority to withhold the communion meal from any person who desires it. It is also my opinion that the church is in no position to judge another person's beliefs about Jesus. The church is responsible for offering the body and blood of Jesus and to let God be the judge of all else. As Jesus offered the meal freely and lovingly, so must the Church. There are some who can present a challenge to this position, but this is how I understand the sacrament of bread and wine. Jesus said "eat and drink in remembrance of me and for the remission of sins" and nothing more. Oh, he did say something about letting the children come to him.


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Session Summary - June 2023

Church Update

The Church office is re-opened after the flooding that occurred on June 11th, with normal hours Tuesday thru Friday 9am - 2pm. Worship is back to being held in the Upstairs Sanctuary.

There is still work to be done at the Church and School; painting, baseboards and plaster work.

The church cost for the flood was about \$3,500. Our church insurance deductible is \$2,500.

Cleaning the Fireside Room in building 3 cost us about \$1,000. The church received a check from the insurance company for more than \$22,000. It may be another few weeks before completed.

Thank you for your support as we continue to get back to normal.



Help Build Hope brings each construction project for a new home to your local business, organization, convention, church, or school parking lot. Volunteers and our experienced full-time staff frame the walls for a new home donated to one of our partnering organizations. We transport the completed frame walls to the partner organization, which finishes the rest of the project.

These events allow people of all ages to participate. Our partners receiving these walls help others achieve affordable home ownership. The walls provide a way to reduce cost for Habitat for Humanity and Fuller Centers for Housing and allow them to complete the homes faster. We travel across the United States as subject matter experts in construction. We partner with local affordable housing partners to identify families and individuals needing services. We provide expert oversight in the form of boots on the ground, heavy equipment, vehicles, and many tools and materials. We hold construction projects to build frame walls that become new homes for needy, deserving families. These projects take place right in your hometown

Saturday July 1, 2023

I had the privilege of volunteering for a <u>Help Build Hope</u> project. Over 150 folks showed up at the downtown commons to build the frame walls for a Habitat for Humanity home.

This took place at our Annual Conference in Coeur d' Alene this spring.

My duties as State Librarian are to maintain records and manage the collection of DAR related documents housed in various Idaho historical archives. To promote projects of the Librarian genealogical value for use by the State or National Society. I am also in charge of 15 librarians from 15 DAR chapters in Idaho. I will be encouraging the chapters to start or continue their Book Clubs and various activities out in their communities. Other activities are in the beginning stages. Each chapter will have a choice to make the project work in their area or not.

The National Society was founded in 1890 to promote Historic Preservation, American History, Education and Patriotism. Its members are descendants from the patriots who won American Independence during the Revolutionary War. With more that 3,000 chapters worldwide, DAR is one of the largest and most active organizations. We celebrated our 1 millionth member in Oct. 2019.
